

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

- To show an understanding of their own feelings, and the feelings of others.
- To begin to regulate their behaviour, and to know right from wrong.
- Give focused attention even when engrossed in an activity.
- Playing co-operatively taking turns.
- To form positive relationships with peers and adults.
- Manage their own basic hygiene.
- Building resilience when trying new activities.

Physical Development

- Negotiate space and obstacles safely.
- Move in a variety of ways with co-ordination and balance.
- Use a range of small tools effectively.
- To hold a pencil effectively for writing.

Communication and Language

- Listen attentively and respond with relevant questions.
- Hold conversation when interacting with peers and adults.
- Expression of ideas, including real life and fictional ideas.
- Using past, present and future forms of language.

Literacy

- To understand and discuss what has been read.
- To use Phonics to decode words.
- To read simple sentences.
- To use Phonics spell words and write simple sentences.

Curriculum Overview for EYFS

Expressive Art and Design

- To use a variety of tools safely.
- To experiment with materials, colour and techniques.
- To share ideas explaining the processes used.
- Represent ideas through music, art, role-play dance and stories.

Mathematics

- Have a deep understanding of numbers to 10 and their compositions.
- To subitise with numbers to 5.
- Compare quantities in different contexts.
- Verbally count beyond 20.
- Explore and represent patterns with numbers to 10.

The EYFS Curriculum 2021 has been split into PRIME AND SPECIFIC areas.

Prime - Personal, Social and Emotional Development, Physical Development and Communication and language.

Specific – Literacy, Mathematics, Understanding the World and Expressive Art and Design

These areas form the basis of the EYFS curriculum.

Understanding the World

- To understand similarities and differences of past and present.
- To talk about similarities and differences in the natural world.
- To understand important processes in the natural world.
- To compare their immediate environment to other places.
- To observe and explore the natural world.
